JUNE 2024 COSTA RICA TRIP REPORT







- Saw a rainbow-like array of beautiful birds throughout our journey, including 4/7 Costa Rican toucans, the elusive and mystical Resplendent Quetzal, and the enchanting scarlet macaw, a lifetime bucket-list species for me.
 - The Species count, though not my highest ever for a trip, was still highly respectable given the 55 species i added to my life list and the endless number of charismatic neotropical birds observed

Species List:

(70 Total Including 55 Lifers!)

- Scarlet Macaw- gorgeous, vibrant bucket list species for Bennett and Celia, saw a number of times along the Pacific Coast of Costa Rica (especially around Quepos), including a lengthy observation of a pair at Crocodile Bridge in Tarcoles.
- 2. **Resplendent Quetzal** charismatic and beautiful target species for Celia and Bennett; we visited a nesting hole with a pair of quetzals several times throughout the day at Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve and were rewarded with partial views of the male and female inside the nest
- 3. Great-Tailed Grackle- many seen while driving through Costa Rica, abundant in Monteverde
- 4. **White-Winged Dove** several seen while driving from airport to La Fortuna, common in open land and human settlements ae visited
- 5. Clay-Colored Thrush- abundant in many areas we visited
- 6. **Rufous-Tailed Hummingbird** several individuals at hummingbird feeders at Treehouse Hotel, saw some in other locations like Quepos
- 7. White-Necked Jacobin- many individuals at hummingbird feeders at Treehouse Hotel
- 8. **Keel-Billed Toucan** two seen in a bird wave on first and second mornings at Treehouse Hotel; one at Coati Treehouse in the morning; beautiful bird and a target species for Bennett
- Yellow-Throated Toucan- one seen in a bird wave at first morning at Treehouse Hotel, same
 individual second morning; one on the side of the road on the way out of Tenorio Volcano NP in a
 tree
- 10. **Montezuma Oropendola** many seen first and second mornings at Treehouse Hotel near breakfast area, fairly common elsewhere in forests
- 11. Red-Lored Parrot- one at the top of a dead tree first and second mornings at Treehouse Hotel
- 12. **Orange-Billed Sparrow** two near our cabin on first morning at Treehouse Hotel, second morning saw some while walking to creek on hotel property
- 13. Red-Throated Ant Tanager- flock near our cabin on first morning at Treehouse Hotel
- 14. **Spectacled Owl** one sleeping in a tree next to one of the cabins at Treehouse Hotel on first morning
- 15. Collared Aracari- one seen at first morning at Treehouse Hotel near breakfast area
- 16. **Blue-Gray Tanager** fairly common; saw first morning at Treehouse Hotel near breakfast area; at Don Olivo chocolate farm, in La Fortuna, and other locations
- 17. Hoffmann's Woodpecker- brief observation of an individual at Don Olivo chocolate plantation
- 18. Great Kiskadee- common in many areas we visited
- 19. Scarlet-Rumped Tanager- a couple seen at Don Olivo chocolate plantation, common elsewhere
- 20. **Black Vulture** two in a dead tree near Don Olivo chocolate plantation; two at a garbage dump in Quepos
- 21. Red-Winged Blackbird- on side of road in La Fortuna
- 22. **Common Pauraque** 3-4 individuals spotted by Octavio in grassy areas near research buildings during our night walk in
- Lesson's Motmot- two individuals perched on wires at Treehouse Hotel on second morning, one
 outside Coati Treehouse
- 24. **Crested Guan** flock of three foraging for fishtail palm fruits in the mid-storey of the forest next to Sendero El Ceibo Trail in Arenal Volcano NP; saw another flock at Mirador el Silencio; saw one from afar at Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 25. **Bicolored Antbird** two seen foraging for insects next to Eciton trail at Sendero El Ceibo Trail in Arenal Volcano NP
- 26. Turkey Vulture- one in a dead tree at Villa Tucan, common in many areas we visited



- 27. Violet-Headed Hummingbird- one spotted at Mistico Hanging Bridges entrance
- 28. Rufous Motmot- observed an individual hunting at Mistico Hanging Bridges for several minutes
- 29. **Crowned Wood-Nymph** spotted one singing on a mid-storey tree brach at Mistico Hanging Bridges
- 30. Tawny-Faced Gnatwren- one foraging in the undergrowth near trail at Mistico Hanging Bridges
- 31. Blue-Backed Grosbeak- a female in an open area at Mistico Hanging Bridges
- 32. Crested Caracara- two flying across a field at Jalapas restaurant outside La Fortuna
- 33. **Great Curassow** got a glimpse of a shy individual as it retreated into the undergrowth at Mirador el Silencio
- 34. Western Cattle Egret- several flocks flying overhead at Mirador el Silencio
- 35. **Swallow-Tailed Kite** one soaring overhead on the road leading to Río Celeste, one flying over the entrance to Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 36. **Lesser Violet-Ear** Many of this dazzling species around at Hummingbird Garden outside Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve; we were able to get up close with many of the hummingbirds there including this species
- 37. Purple-Throated Mountain Gem- common and beautiful species at Hummingbird Garden
- 38. **Green-Crowned Brilliant** abundant at Hummingbird Garden; one seen singing on a branch inside Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 39. **Violet Sabrewing** several individuals of this large and vivid hummingbird seen at Hummingbird Garden
- 40. **Green Hermit** one individual of this distinct hummingbird seen briefly at Hummingbird Garden; one seen feeding on heliconia flowers inside Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 41. Stripe-Tailed Hummingbird- several around at Hummingbird Garden
- 42. **Emerald Toucanet** two individuals seen in different locations within Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 43. **White-Throated Thrush** many heard and seen in various locations within Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 44. Black-Faced Solitaire- often heard and seen briefly in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 45. Common Chlorospingus- common in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 46. Black-Headed Nightingale-Thrush- common in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 47. Coppery-Headed Emerald- several around at Hummingbird Garden
- 48. Gray-Breasted Wood Wren- one seen second morning at Coati Treehouse
- 49. **Yellow-Throated Euphonia** one seen second morning at Coati Treehouse; a pair at their next outside Tenorio Volcano NP
- 50. **White-Eared Ground Sparrow** one seen second morning at Coati Treehouse; one at Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 51. **Yellowish Flycatcher** probably common in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve; however only one that was seen was confidently identified
- 52. Costa Rican Warbler- common in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve
- 53. **Bananaquit** several seen in Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve and around Coati Treehouse; also seen briefly in other locations
- 54. House Wren- One seen in the grassy area along the
- 55. Morelet's Seedeater- in a grassy field outside Tenorio Volcano NP
- 56. Variable Seedeater- in a grassy field outside Tenorio Volcano NP
- 57. Thick-Billed Seed Finch- in a grassy field outside Tenorio Volcano NP
- 58. **Tropical Kingbird** multiple places including Jalapas Restaurant outside La Fortuna, Mirador el Silencio and Tenorio Volcano NP
- 59. **Yellow-Headed Caracara** Individual pecking at roadkill along the road to Biesanz Beach in Quepos



- 60. **Gray-Cowled Wood Rail** one poking around for food at Biesanz Beach; two individuals spotlighted on mangrove boat tour perched on vegetation at the water's edge
- 61. Brown Pelican- a number of flocks flew over our catamaran near Manuel Antonio NP coastline
- 62. White Ibis- one flock flew over our catamaran near Manuel Antonio NP coastline
- 63. **American Pygmy Kingfisher** two individuals spotlighted on mangrove boat tour perched on vegetation at the water's edge
- 64. Black-Hooded Antshrike- one individual near an Eciton army ant trail in Manuel Antonio NP
- 65. **Plain Xenops** One brief observation of this species as it flew through the forest on one of the quieter trails of Manuel Antonio NP
- 66. **Ochre-Bellied Flycatcher** single sleeping individual spotlighted on a branch on final night tour near Quepos
- 67. **Black-Throated Trogon** A dozing male and female spotlighted on tree branches on final night tour near Quepos.
- 68. **Purple Gallinule** one seen on banks of Tarcoles River below Crocodile Bridge on final morning of trip
- 69. Northern Rough-Winged Swallow- perched on a wire outside Mirador el Silencio
- 70. **Gray-Headed Chachalaca** one individual perched atop a dead tree outside Coati Treehouse in Monteverde
